# MINUTES COUNTY OF HALIFAX BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS REGULAR MEETING April 25, 2017

Note to Reader: Although the printed agenda document for this Board meeting is not part of these minutes, the agenda document provides background information on most all of the items discussed by the Board at this meeting. The Halifax County Board of Commissioners held a Regular Meeting on Tuesday, April 25, 2017, at 5:30 P. M. in the Historic Courthouse, Halifax, North Carolina.

#### Call to Order

Chairman Bryant called the meeting to order.

#### **Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance**

Chairman Bryant provided the invocation and the Pledge of Allegiance was then recited.

#### Adoption of the Agenda

Commissioner Manning moved to approve the agenda as presented. Commissioner Brewer seconded the motion, which passed unanimously by voice vote.

#### **Conflict of Interest Statement**

There were no conflicts of interest noted by any member of the Board.

#### 1. FY 2017-2018 Budget Discussion

Tony N. Brown, County Manager, addressed the Board regarding the FY 2017-2018 Budget.

He provided and reviewed the updated Outside Request. He stated that after the April 17, 2017 Regular Meeting, a letter of request was received from Chad Brandon, North Carolina Forest Service District Forester, requesting an increase in funding in the amount of \$4,066 to assist with the purchase of a new truck and a proposed State cost of living increase in the amount of 2% or \$800, whichever was greater. He further stated that the amount currently in the balanced budget was in the amount of \$110,000 and if the Board approved the request for an additional \$4,066 the total amount would be \$114,066. He advised that Jim Short, Halifax County Forest Ranger, was in attendance to answer questions. Mr. Short echoed the sentiments of the letter of request. He stated that the total cost of the completely outfitted truck was in the amount of approximately \$55,000.

Commissioner Manning moved to approve the North Carolina Forestry Protection Management request for additional funds in the amount of \$4,066. Commissioner Brewer seconded the motion, which passed unanimously by voice vote.

Mr. Brown stated that during the April 17, 2017 Regular Meeting, Commissioner Manning requested that the salary comparison spreadsheet be revised using olympic scoring, which would dropped the highest and lowest salaries. He further stated that of the counties that were in commuting distance from Halifax County, Wilson had seven of the highest salaries and Halifax County had four of the lowest salaries. He advised that the salaries of the County was behind an average of 10.03% in comparison to the other counties that were in commuting distance. He provided a copy of the updated spreadsheet for the Board's review.

Mr. Brown stated that during the last meeting after he presented seven budget options, it was the consensus of the Board that he would update Options Four, Four A, and Four B for further discussion as follows:

Option Four included only Fund Balance. This option would use \$1,652,521 of Fund Balance that would reduce the percentage to 8%, \$3,403,003, and additional funds in the amount of \$14,021 would be available to use elsewhere. Option Four does fund the following: Additional School Capital Funding: Halifax Community College \$171,500; Halifax County Schools \$175,000; Roanoke Rapids Graded School District \$190,000; and Weldon City Schools \$187,500; Halifax County Departmental Unfinanced Capital Requirements \$240,000; pending Outside Requests: Staff Recommendation \$174,500 and Board of Commissioners Additions

\$12,000; Employee Competitive Market Adjustment, no funding stream attached, 2%, \$300,000; and Employee Step Adjustment, no funding stream attached, \$188,000. Option Four does not fund the following: Employee Pay for Performance Plan, must add other employee adjustment percentage to this amount if applicable, \$248,000.

Option Four A included only Fund Balance. This option would use \$1,865,208 of Fund Balance that would reduce the percentage to 7.5%, \$3,190,315 and additional funds in the amount of \$161,748 would be available to use elsewhere. Option Four A does fund the following: Additional School Capital Funding: Halifax Community College \$171,500; Halifax County Schools \$175,000; Roanoke Rapids Graded School District \$190,000; and Weldon City Schools \$187,500; Halifax County Departmental Unfinanced Capital Requirements in the amount of \$240,000; pending Outside Requests: Staff Recommendation \$174,500 and Board of Commissioners Additions \$12,000; Employee Competitive Market Adjustment, no funding stream attached, 2%, \$300,000; and Employee Pay for Performance Plan, must add other employee 2% adjustment: \$248,000 + 2% \$4,960, no funding stream attached. Option Four A does not fund the following: Employee Step Adjustment, no funding stream attached, \$188,000.

Option Four B included only Fund Balance. This option would use \$2,077,896 of Fund Balance that would reduce the percentage to 7%, \$2,977,628 and additional funds in the amount of \$182,370 would be available to use elsewhere. Option Four B does fund the following: Additional School Capital Funding: Halifax Community College \$171,500; Halifax County Schools \$175,000; Roanoke Rapids Graded School District \$190,000, Weldon City Schools \$187,500; Halifax County Departmental Unfinanced Capital Requirements \$240,000; Outside Requests: Staff Recommendation \$174,500 and Board of Commissioners Additions: April 17, 2017 Regular Meeting \$12,000 and April 25, 2017 Regular Meeting \$4,066; Employee Competitive Market Adjustment 2%, \$300,000; Employee Step Adjustment \$188,000; and Employee Pay for Performance Plan, must add other employee 2% adjustment: \$248,000 + 2% \$4,960, \$252,960.

Mr. Brown provided a brief comparison regarding the difference between the Commissioners designated reserve Fund Balance and what was required by the Local Government Commission.

Commissioner Qualls stated that he knew that the County was behind in employee compensation, especially the salaries of the Sheriff's Office as the job of law enforcement officers was dangerous. He further stated that he was sympathetic in regards to the low salaries of the deputies and had been told that some of the deputies were on public assistance, which was just wrong and needed to be corrected. He advised that he made a statement during the January 3, 2017 Regular Meeting that discussions had been held for years regarding employee compensation and how far the County's salaries were behind other localities. He further advised that he did not understand why employee compensation was not discussed at the beginning of the budget preparation if it was top priority instead of at the end. He inquired if the Board was to choose one of the proposed budget options and compared it with the current total budget; would the budget be increasing, decreasing, or stable. Mr. Brown stated that he did not have last year's budget numbers. He stated that when the December 2016 Board Retreat was held, part of the discussion was to receive direction from the Board regarding employee compensation for the

upcoming budget; at which time no direction was given. He further stated that if direction was provided during the retreat it would have been included in the balanced budget and the Board would now be discussing how to fund additional capital.

Commissioner Qualls stated that his concern with the proposed budget was that the County was shrinking, losing revenue, and was not growing economically; however, the budget was increasing. Mr. Brown responded that there was growth in the budget but it was absorbed by other increases. Commissioner Qualls stated that there had been some huge challenges in regards to the County's revenue and was in favor of employee compensation; however, the County needed to grow, raise taxes, or cut programs to fund an increase in expenditures. He further stated that the budget did not appear to cut any expenditures; however, it grows the budget with a decreasing population and tax base without a lot of growth economically. He advised that he agreed on employee compensation; however, employee compensation should be the first funds expended and not the last. He further advised that he wanted employees to have a raise; however, the Board had to decide long term what County government was required to fund. He explained that if the Board was going to fund employee compensation, which he agreed on 100%, then other items in which the Board was not required to fund at some point would have to be left off the budget or there would have to be some substantial growth. He further explained that fundamentally a discussion needed to be held regarding the options that Mr. Brown provided which stated that there were no funding streams attached.

Mr. Brown stated that with the County's revenue based budgeting, there were large sums of money, even millions, that was rolled over each year once staff completed an internal audit. Commissioner Qualls responded that the Board could not count on those funds; which was why those funds were budgeted. Mr. Brown stated that the \$2 Million that was found from the Department of Social Services helped the proposed budget tremendously. Commissioner Qualls agreed; however, inquired if funds were not found next year and this spending stream has been established, then what. Mr. Brown responded that the Board would have to address the shortfall at that time. Commissioner Qualls stated that it was important that the funding stream be addressed first. Mr. Brown stated that a lot of what was done with the proposed budget was forecasting. He further stated that historically the budgets were always prepared conservatively, which was why funds were leftover every year. He advised that funds could not be projected that were higher than the tax collection rate the previous year which was why the budget was prepared conservatively. He further advised that this year there was some growth because sales tax was higher; however, the budget was projected very low and there would be a higher windfall from sales tax this year into next year than was projected. He explained that with revenue based budgeting the funds left over from the previous year helped with the upcoming year. He further explained that he was taking advantage of what was saved last year to cover this year's budget.

Mr. Brown stated that when the economy declined some years ago the County's conservative budget projection underwent drastic cuts during the year. Commissioner Qualls inquired what the Fund Balance was during that time. Mr. Brown stated that the highest working Fund Balance was approximately 40%. Commissioner Qualls stated that it was now 7%. Mr. Brown stated that Commissioner Qualls voted against the budget two years ago because a raise was given to employees and there was no funding stream. Commissioner Qualls agreed and

stated that a funding stream should have been from taxes, growth, or cutting programs. Mr. Brown stated that if the Board had provided direction during the retreat in December to plan for a 2% cost of living adjustment this discussion would not be held at this time; however, discussions would be held regarding unfunded capital needs. Commissioner Qualls stated that he provided direction in January 2017 after the Board's retreat. He further stated that he was not familiar with the programs that were funded that did not have to be funded. He recommended that some attention and discussion needed to be held in that area of the budget. He advised that it was unfortunate that Halifax was a poor county, moderately to high taxed. He further advised that the poorest people in the County would receive a \$.10 tax increase this year in regards to the Halifax County Schools supplemental school tax. He explained that until the County had substantial growth, the Board needed to review its spending. Mr. Brown stated that there were a lot of programs that the County funded that was not required; however, those programs were funded because they added to the value of our culture such as the Library. Commissioner Qualls stated that regardless of the program, he had been on the Board for almost three years and employee compensation was one of the topics that he had heard discussed more than anything else from the Sheriff, County Manager, and staff. He further stated that he was not opposed to increasing employee compensation; however, if it was one of the biggest issues facing the morale of our employees, it should be discussed at the beginning of the budget. He advised that some of the programs that the County did not have to fund needed to be reviewed and the Board as whole would need to make tough decision on those items if we valued our employees as we all say we do. He further advised that was his budget guidance in January after the December retreat.

Chairman Bryant stated that he agreed 100% with the sentiments of Commissioner Qualls. He further stated that he was confident that direction would be given regarding one of the proposed options. He advised that Commissioner Qualls had provided the County Manager and Management Team with some direction for the upcoming December retreat, which was to consider employee compensation first in preparing the budget.

Commissioner Brewer stated that she knew that the County employees were underpaid and advised that the proposed options that did not have a funding stream was of great concern. She agreed with the sentiments of Commissioner Qualls and stated that the County had a shrinking population and that property values had decreased in lots of areas that greatly impacted the County's revenue stream.

Commissioner Smith stated that he did not totally agree with all of the sentiments of Commissioners Qualls; however, every point that was made was valid. He further stated that during his tenure, he recalled that the 18% to 22% Fund Balance that the Board decided to maintain resulted in the County having one of the highest Fund Balances in the State of North Carolina. He advised that the General Assembly began to look at what the counties had in their coffers, which dictated some proposed legislation that was ultimately not approved. He further advised that at that time, the Board began to review and allocate funds for needs that had gone unfunded. He recalled that there had been several years in which the County had not replaced the Sheriff's Office patrol vehicles until there was an incident wherein a Sheriff deputy responded to an emergency call regarding a shooting in Hollister and the same deputy had to respond to another emergency call regarding a stabbing in Hobgood and while responding to the

second call his vehicle became inoperable. He explained that after that incident the Board allocated funds to purchase approximately 12 vehicles because public safety was important.

Commissioner Smith stated that in regards to looking at programs that the County was not required to fund; the County was a tier one county and possibly because of Halifax County the tiers were being reevaluated. He further stated that some of the employees were benefiting from some of the programs that the County was not required to fund. He advised that he was aware that some of the Sheriff's deputies were receiving public assistance and that there were other deputies that would qualify; however, were not receiving public assistance for various reasons. He further advised that in regards to the Halifax County Schools pending supplemental school tax, there had been unfairness for years in regards to how this distribution was done. He explained that he voted, along with other citizens in the County, and the supplemental school tax passed; which was a self-tax that Halifax County Schools had to request. He further explained that County taxes were increased to fund a school in the Roanoke Rapids Graded School District; however, there were two other school districts that the County funded. He stated that Halifax County was one of the few remaining counties in the State that still had three school systems that had to be funded equally in accordance with the State statute, along with the Halifax Community College. He further stated that in regards to economic development he had raised many concerns about where the County was going and when progress would be seen. He advised that he received some positive and negative comments regarding the sale of the Littleton Industrial Building. He further advised that upon becoming a Commissioner, he inherited the Littleton Industrial Building in which the County had invested a considerable amount of funds and had received no return on that investment. He explained that he agreed with Commissioner Qualls in regards to identifying areas to fund especially regarding economic development.

Commissioner Manning stated that there were issues regarding employee compensation that needed to be reviewed; however, it was too late to be done for this budget year. He requested that employee compensation be reviewed in anticipation of next year's budget because it was necessary. He further requested that Mr. Brown provide the Board, between now and the next retreat, a list of programs that the County was required to fund and those that the County was not required to fund that were being funded. He stated that in regards to capital outlay, the County needed to maintain its buildings as preventative maintenance was important. He further stated that he was in favor of Option 4B.

Commissioner Qualls inquired if the County did not have growth and approved Option 4B, where would the funding stream be found. He inquired if there was a commitment from the Board to review programs that the County did not have to fund or would there be a tax increase. Commissioner Manning stated that was why he requested that the County Manager provide information. Chairman Bryant stated that discussion could begin during the retreat in December, if not before. Mr. Brown stated that if the Board had provided him with direction during the retreat regarding employee compensation it would have been included in the budget using a funding stream that would have been already included.

Chairman Bryant stated that he needed consensus from the Board regarding the proposed options. He inquired if Commissioners Qualls was agreeable with Option 4B in regards to obtaining a consensus and moving forward to provide direction to the County Manager.

Commissioner Qualls stated that he sensed that the Board was in favor of moving forward with Option 4B and responded yes. Chairman Bryant along with Commissioners Manning, Smith and Brewer recommended Option 4B. It was the consensus of the Board to direct the County Manager to move forward with finalizing the proposed budget using Option 4B.

Mr. Brown stated that confirmation was needed to add an additional Sheriff's deputy position that would be assigned to the Department of Social Services as they would be changing the security contract with Alpha Security to have an armed security officer. He further stated that funds were available in the budget. It was the consensus of the Board to approve the request.

He further requested confirmation regarding the Halifax County Schools Supplemental Tax in the amount of \$.10 and Weldon City Schools Supplemental Tax in the amount of \$.20. Commissioner Qualls inquired if the Board would have to vote on the Halifax County Schools Supplemental Tax. Mr. Brown stated that it would be part of the entire budget that would be approved by the Board. It was the consensus of the Board to approve the request.

Commissioner Manning stated that the Board did not set the supplemental school tax by \$.10 as the residents within the Halifax County Schools district voted to approve the supplemental tax. He further stated that Dr. Eric Cunningham, Halifax County Schools Superintendent, sent a letter stating that the Halifax County Schools Board of Education was requesting a supplement tax rate in the amount of \$.10. He stated that only the property owners and residents within the Halifax County Schools district would be taxed.

#### 2. Other Business

Chairman Bryant requested that the Board approve a congratulatory letter to Melinda Hardy, District 6 Administrator, commending and congratulating local Guardian ad Litem Child Advocates for their unselfish and outstanding service to Halifax County and its citizens in recognition of National Child Advocate Month.

Commissioner Manning moved to approve the letter as presented. Commissioner Qualls seconded the motion, which passed unanimously by voice vote.

Chairman Bryant stated that Gilbert M. Portela had lived and worked in Halifax County for many years and was very ill. He further stated that Mr. Portela was very active in the community and was the founder of Angel's Closet, Inc., which was a tremendous resource and asset to thousands of children and families in need in Halifax County, Northampton County and Southside Virginia. He requested that the Board adopt a proclamation proclaiming Gilbert Portela Day in Halifax County along with a small reception in his honor. After a brief discussion was held regarding this matter, it was the consensus of the Board to recognize Mr. Portela during the May 1, 2017 Regular Meeting.

Commissioner Manning stated that correspondence had been received from Nancy Jackson, Town of Scotland Neck Administrator/Clerk, requesting a change in the distribution method of sales tax from the ad valorem method to a per capita method. He further stated that

under the ad valorem basis all taxing entities would share in the sales tax to include municipalities, Our Community Hospital, school districts, and all fire departments. He advised that under the per capita method municipalities and the County were the only entities that would share in the distribution of sales tax. He further advised that if the Board approved the request, he would recommend that the County reimburse the entities that would be losing funds in order that they would be able to continue operating without a loss in funding.

Commissioner Manning moved to do nothing in regards to changing the ad valorem sales tax distribution. Commissioner Qualls seconded the motion.

Upon discussion, Commissioner Qualls stated that the only concern that he had in regards to changing the sales tax distribution was Halifax County Schools, which had been accomplished. Chairman Bryant echoed the sentiments of Commissioner Qualls.

The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

Mr. Brown reminded the Board of the following updates: The County would be hosting the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners District Meeting on April 25, 2017 at the Hilton Garden Inn in Roanoke Rapids at 5:30 P. M. The North Carolina Department for Natural and Cultural Resources Secretary, Susi H. Hamilton, would be visiting on Friday, April 28, 2017, during the morning hours followed by a discussion meeting at 2:30 P. M. which would include the County's legislators. The Employee Appreciation Picnic would also be held on Friday, April 28, 2017 from 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M.

#### 3. Closed Session

There were no matters for discussion under Closed Session.

### 4. Adjourn until the May 1, 2017 Regular Meeting

Commissioner Smith moved to adjourn the meeting until the May 1, 2017 Regular Meeting. Commissioner Brewer seconded the motion, which passed unanimously by voice vote.

The Division of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS), in collaboration with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, has received USDA grant funding to offer the Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (SFMNP) in 2018. This innovative program has dual goals. One goal is to improve the nutritional status of low income congregate nutrition site participants by enabling them to purchase fresh fruits and vegetables at local farmers' markets. A second goal is to stimulate business for the local farmers and create a greater awareness of the farmers' market.

The 2018 SFMNP program time period is July 1, 2018 through September 30, 2018. DAAS will provide coupons to the congregate nutrition programs in participating counties and these local providers will distribute coupons to eligible congregate nutrition program participants. The congregate nutrition program will provide the older adults with one set of coupons worth \$21 during the 2018 growing season and the sites are encouraged to offer "field trips" for the participants to visit the local farmers' market to redeem their coupons. The coupons and education materials for the participants will be distributed during regional training sessions scheduled in June.

# Attachment A General Terms and Conditions

#### **DEFINITIONS**

Unless indicated otherwise from the context, the following terms shall have the following meanings in this Contract. Some definitions are from 9 NCAC 3M.0102 unless otherwise noted. If the rule or statute that is the source of the definition is changed by the adopting authority, the change shall be incorporated herein.

- (1) "Recipient" (as used in the context of the definitions below) shall mean and include every public office, public officer or official (State or local, elected or appointed), institution, board, commission, bureau, council, department, authority or other unit of government of the State or of any county, unit, special district or other political subagency of government. For other purposes in this Contract, "Recipient" shall mean the entity identified as one of the parties hereto.
- (2) "Audit" means an examination of records or financial accounts to verify their accuracy.
- (3) "Certification of Compliance" means a report provided by the Recipient to the Office of the State Auditor that states that the Subrecipient has met the reporting requirements established by this Subchapter and included a statement of certification by the Recipient and copies of the submitted Subrecipient reporting package.
- (4) "Compliance Supplement" refers to the North Carolina State Compliance Supplement, maintained by the State and Local Government Finance Agency within the North Carolina Department of State Treasurer that has been developed in cooperation with agencies to assist the local auditor in identifying program compliance requirements and audit procedures for testing those requirements.
- (5) "Contract" means a legal instrument that is used to reflect a relationship between the Recipient, Subrecipient, and subgrantee.
- (6) "Fiscal Year" means the annual operating year of the non-State entity.
- (7) "Financial Assistance" means assistance that non-State entities receive or administer in the form of grants, loans, loan guarantees, property (including donated surplus property), cooperative agreements, interest subsidies, insurance, food commodities, direct appropriations, and other assistance. Financial assistance does not include amounts received as reimbursement for services rendered to

- individuals for Medicare and Medicaid patient services.
- (8) "Financial Statement" means a report providing financial statistics relative to a given part of an organization's operations or status.
- (9) "Grant" means financial assistance provided by an Recipient, Subrecipient, or subgrantee to carry out activities whereby the grantor anticipates no programmatic involvement with the Subrecipient or subgrantee during the performance of the grant.
- (10) "Subrecipient" has the meaning in NCGS 143C-6-23(a)(2): a non-State entity that receives a grant of State funds from a State agency, department, or institution but does not include any non-State entity subject to the audit and other reporting requirements of the Local Government Commission. For other purposes in this Contract, "Subrecipient" shall mean the entity identified as one of the parties hereto.
- (11) "Grantor" means an entity that provides resources, generally financial, to another entity in order to achieve a specified goal or objective.
- (12) "Non-State Entity" has the meaning in NCGS 143C-1-1(d)(18): Any of the following that is not a State agency: An individual, a firm, a partnership, an association, a county, a corporation, or any other organization acting as a unit. The term includes a unit of local government and public authority.
- (13) "Public Authority" has the meaning in NCGS 143C-1-1(d)(22): A municipal corporation that is not a unit of local government or a local governmental authority, board, commission, council, or agency that (i) is not a municipal corporation and (ii) operates on an area, regional, or multiunit basis, and the budgeting and accounting systems of which are not fully a part of the budgeting and accounting systems of a unit of local government.
- (14) "Single Audit" means an audit that includes an examination of an organization's financial statements, internal controls, and compliance with the requirements of Federal or State awards.
- (15) "Special Appropriation" means a legislative act authorizing the expenditure of a designated amount of public funds for a specific purpose.
- (16) "State Funds" means any funds appropriated by the North Carolina General Assembly or

collected by the State of North Carolina. State funds include federal financial assistance received by the State and transferred or disbursed to non-State entities. Both Federal and State funds maintain their identity as they are subgranted to other organizations. Pursuant to NCGS 143C-6-23(a)(1), the terms "State grant funds" and "State grants" do not include any payment made by the Medicaid program, the State Health Plan for Teachers and State Employees, or other similar medical programs.

- (17) "Subgrantee" has the meaning in NCGS 143C-6-23(a)(3): a non-State entity that receives State funds as a grant from a grantee or from another subgrantee but does not include any non-State entity subject to the audit and other reporting requirements of the Local Government Commission.
- (18) "Unit of Local Government" has the meaning in NCGS 143C-1-1(d)(29): A municipal corporation that has the power to levy taxes, including a consolidated city-county as defined by NCGS 160B-2(1), and all boards, agencies, commissions, authorities, and institutions thereof that are not municipal corporations.

#### Relationships of the Parties

Independent Contractor: The Subrecipient is and shall be deemed to be an independent contractor in the performance of this Contract and as such shall be wholly responsible for the work to be performed and for the supervision of its employees. The Subrecipient represents that it has, or shall secure at its own expense, all personnel required in performing the services under this agreement. Such employees shall not be employees of, or have any individual contractual relationship with, the Recipient.

Subcontracting: The Subrecipient shall not subcontract any of the work contemplated under this Contract without prior written approval from the Recipient. Any approved subcontract shall be subject to all conditions of this Contract. Only the subcontractors or subgrantees specified in the contract documents are to be considered approved upon award of the contract. The Recipient shall not be obligated to pay for any work performed by any unapproved subcontractor or subgrantee. The Subrecipient shall be responsible for the performance of all of its subgrantees and shall not be relieved of any of the duties and responsibilities of this Contract.

**Subgrantees:** The Subrecipient has the responsibility to ensure that all subgrantees, if any, provide all information necessary to permit the Subrecipient to comply with the standards set forth in this Contract.

**Assignment:** No assignment of the Subrecipient's obligations or the Subrecipient's right to receive payment hereunder shall be permitted. However, upon written request approved by the issuing purchasing authority, the State may:

- (a) Forward the Subrecipient's payment check(s) directly to any person or entity designated by the Subrecipient, or
- (b) Include any person or entity designated by Subrecipient as a joint payee on the Subrecipient's payment check(s).

In no event shall such approval and action obligate the State to anyone other than the Subrecipient and the Subrecipient shall remain responsible for fulfillment of all contract obligations.

Beneficiaries: Except as herein specifically provided otherwise, this Contract shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their respective successors. It is expressly understood and agreed that the enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Contract, and all rights of action relating to such enforcement, shall be strictly reserved to the Recipient and the named Subrecipient. Nothing contained in this document shall give or allow any claim or right of action whatsoever by any other third person. It is the express intention of the Recipient and Subrecipient that any such person or entity, other than the Recipient or the Subrecipient, receiving services or benefits under this Contract shall be deemed an incidental beneficiary only.

#### **Indemnity**

**Indemnification:** The Subrecipient agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Recipient, the State of North Carolina, and any of their officers, agents and employees, from any claims of third parties arising out of any act or omission of the Subrecipient in connection with the performance of this Contract.

#### **Default and Termination**

**Termination by Mutual Consent:** The Parties may terminate this Contract by mutual consent with 60 days notice to the other party, or as otherwise provided by law.

Termination Without Cause: The Recipient may terminate this contract without cause by giving 60 days

written notice to the Contractor. In that event, all finished or unfinished deliverable items prepared by the Contractor under this contract shall, at the option of the Recipient, become its property and the Contractor shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such materials, minus any payment or compensation previously made.

Termination for Cause: If, through any cause, the Subrecipient shall fail to fulfill its obligations under this Contract in a timely and proper manner, the Recipient shall have the right to terminate this Contract by giving written notice to the Subrecipient and specifying the effective date thereof. In that event, all finished or unfinished deliverable items prepared by the Subrecipient under this Contract shall, at the option of the Recipient, become its property and the Subrecipient shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such materials, minus any payment or compensation previously made. Notwithstanding the foregoing provision, the Subrecipient shall not be relieved of liability to the Recipient for damages sustained by the Recipient by virtue of the Subrecipient's breach of this agreement, and the Recipient may withhold any payment due the Subrecipient for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due the Recipient from such breach can be determined.

Waiver of Default: Waiver by the Recipient of any default or breach in compliance with the terms of this Contract by the Subrecipient shall not be deemed a waiver of any subsequent default or breach and shall not be construed to be modification of the terms of this Contract unless stated to be such in writing, signed by an authorized representative of the Recipient and the Subrecipient and attached to the contract.

Availability of Funds: The parties to this Contract agree and understand that the payment of the sums specified in this Contract is dependent and contingent upon and subject to the appropriation, allocation, and availability of funds for this purpose to the Recipient.

Force Majeure: Neither party shall be deemed to be in default of its obligations hereunder if and so long as it is prevented from performing such obligations by any act of war, hostile foreign action, nuclear explosion, riot, strikes, civil insurrection, earthquake, hurricane, tornado, or other catastrophic natural event or act of God.

**Survival of Promises:** All promises, requirements, terms, conditions, provisions, representations, guarantees, and warranties contained herein shall survive

the contract expiration or termination date unless specifically provided otherwise herein, or unless superseded by applicable federal or state statutes of limitation.

Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA): The Contractor agrees that, if the Recipient determines that some or all of the activities within the scope of this contract are subject to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, P.L. 104-91, as amended ("HIPAA"), or its implementing regulations, it will comply with the HIPAA requirements and will execute such agreements and practices as the Recipient may require to ensure compliance.

Executive Order # 24: "By Executive Order 24, issued by Governor Perdue, and NCGS 133-32, it is unlawful for any vendor or contractor ( i.e. architect, bidder, contractor, construction manager, design professional, engineer, landlord, offeror, seller, subcontractor, supplier, or vendor), to make gifts or to give favors to any State employee of the Governor's Cabinet Agencies (i.e., Administration, Commerce, Correction, Crime Control and Public Safety, Cultural Resources, Environment and Natural Resources, Health and Human Services, Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, Revenue, Transportation, and the Office of the Governor). #### **Intellectual Property Rights**

Copyrights and Ownership of Deliverables: All deliverable items produced pursuant to this Contract are the exclusive property of the Recipient. The Subrecipient shall not assert a claim of copyright or other property interest in such deliverables.

#### Compliance with Applicable Laws

Compliance with Laws: The Subrecipient shall comply with all laws, ordinances, codes, rules, regulations, and licensing requirements that are applicable to the conduct of its business, including those of federal, state, and local agencies having jurisdiction and/or authority.

**Equal Employment Opportunity:** The Subrecipient shall comply with all federal and state laws relating to equal employment opportunity.

#### Confidentiality

Confidentiality: Any information, data, instruments, documents, studies or reports given to or prepared or assembled by the Subrecipient under this agreement shall be kept as confidential and not divulged or made available to any individual or organization without the prior written approval of the Recipient. The Subrecipient acknowledges that in receiving, storing, processing or otherwise dealing with any confidential information it will safeguard and not further disclose the information except as otherwise provided in this Contract.

#### Oversight

Access to Persons and Records: The State Auditor shall have access to persons and records as a result of all contracts or grants entered into by State agencies or political subdivisions in accordance with NCGS 147-64.7. Additionally, as the State funding authority, the Recipient and all applicable federal agencies or their agents shall have access to persons and records as a result of all contracts or grants entered into by State agencies or political subdivisions.

**Record Retention:** Records shall not be destroyed, purged or disposed of without the express written consent of the Recipient. State basic records retention policy requires all grant records to be retained for a minimum of five years or until all audit exceptions have been resolved, whichever is longer. If the contract is subject to federal policy and regulations, record retention may be longer than five years since records must be retained for a period of three years following submission of the final Federal Financial Status Report, if applicable, or three years following the submission of a revised final Federal Financial Status Report. Also, if any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, disallowance action, or other action involving this Contract has been started before expiration of the five-year retention period described above, the records must be retained until completion of the action and resolution of all issues

which arise from it, or until the end of the regular fiveyear period described above, whichever is later.

#### Miscellaneous

Choice of Law: The validity of this Contract and any of its terms or provisions, as well as the rights and duties of the parties to this Contract, are governed by the laws of North Carolina. The Subrecipient, by signing this Contract, agrees and submits, solely for matters concerning this Contract, to the exclusive jurisdiction of the courts of North Carolina and agrees, solely for such purpose, that the exclusive venue for any legal proceedings shall be Wake County, North Carolina. The place of this Contract and all transactions and agreements relating to it, and their situs and forum, shall be Wake County, North Carolina, where all matters. whether sounding in contract or tort, relating to the validity, construction, interpretation, and enforcement shall be determined.

Amendment: This Contract may not be amended orally or by performance. Any amendment must be made in written form and executed by duly authorized representatives of the Recipient and the Subrecipient.

Severability: In the event that a court of competent jurisdiction holds that a provision or requirement of this Contract violates any applicable law, each such provision or requirement shall continue to be enforced to the extent it is not in violation of law or is not otherwise unenforceable and all other provisions and requirements of this Contract shall remain in full force and effect.

**Headings:** The Section and Paragraph headings in these General Terms and Conditions are not material parts of the agreement and should not be used to construe the meaning thereof.

**Time of the Essence:** Time is of the essence in the performance of this Contract.

**Key Personnel:** The Contractor shall not replace any of the key personnel assigned to the performance of this contract without the prior written approval of the Recipient. The term "key personnel" includes any and all persons identified as such in the contract documents and any other persons subsequently identified as key personnel by the written agreement of the parties.

Care of Property: The Subrecipient agrees that it shall be responsible for the proper custody and care of any property furnished to it for use in connection with the performance of this Contract and will reimburse the Recipient for loss of, or damage to, such property. At the termination of this Contract, the Subrecipient shall contact the Recipient for instructions as to the disposition of such property and shall comply with these instructions.

**Travel Expenses:** Reimbursement to the Subrecipient for travel mileage, meals, lodging and other travel expenses incurred in the performance of this Contract shall be reasonable and supported by documentation. State rates should be used as guidelines. International travel shall not be reimbursed under this Contract.

Sales/Use Tax Refunds: If eligible, the Subrecipient and all subgrantees shall: (a) ask the North Carolina Department of Revenue for a refund of all sales and use taxes paid by them in the performance of this Contract, pursuant to NCGS 105-164.14; and (b) exclude all refundable sales and use taxes from all reportable expenditures before the expenses are entered in their reimbursement reports.

Advertising: The Subrecipient shall not use the award of this Contract as a part of any news release or commercial advertising, except as allowed in Attachment B.

Monthly Prevention and Wellness Campaign posters will be displayed in the Council on Aging office and distributed to the following sites for display: Jo Story Senior Center, Scotland Neck Senior Center, Hobgood Community Center, Rural Health Groups, and senior housing communities. During one on one counseling sessions and outreach events, prevention information will be distributed.

Halifax County Council on Aging will submit Client Counseling contact forms and Public and Media outreach forms in a timely manner through the SHIPtalk website.

Halifax County Council on Aging works with the Upper Coastal Plain Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging on a consistent basis. Halifax County Council on Aging will coordinate outreach events in the county in collaboration with the Senior Medicare Patrol Coordinator from Upper Coastal Plain AAA.

Halifax County Council on Aging will utilize the \$1,000 slated for technology upgrade to purchase equipment, BrightSign HD223 to connect to a monitor that displays Medicare information including Low-Income Subsidy and Medicare Savings Plan, Medicare events, and Medicare news. - Invite your legislative delegation to a meeting to discuss your legislative goals. At the
  meeting with your legislators, recognize each of them by name, thank them for
  attending, and invite any guests in the room to introduce themselves.
- Note that the purpose of the meeting is to help legislators understand the NCACC goals and other issues for consideration in the legislative session, and to receive their input and guidance for advancing and addressing these key county issues.
- Discuss each goal and issue. Ask each legislator to share thoughts on recommended approaches.
- Designate someone to complete the enclosed Legislative Feedback Form. Include suggestions, concerns, and any issues that might need follow-up by NCACC staff.
- Share your feedback with NCACC staff; either by having a designated commissioner report on your meeting at the April NCACC district meeting your board plans to attend; or by e-mailing your form to Government Relations Coordinator, Amber Harris at amber.harris@ncacc.org.

**2018 Priority Goal:** Seek legislation to establish a new state-county partnership to address statewide public school capital challenges--including but not limited to maintenance, renovation, construction and debt—through a dedicated, stable funding stream that is consistent from county to county and sufficient to meet the school facility needs of all 100 counties.

#### **Talking Points**:

- While counties and the state have distinct responsibilities to build and operate schools, we have always partnered to share these responsibilities. Counties contribute significantly to school operations while the state has provided financing and direct funding for school capital.
- When the NC Education Lottery was enacted in 2005, 40% of the annual net proceeds were directed to the Public School Building Capital Fund to replace bonds and financing with a sustainable source of revenue to help counties address these needs.
- Since 2010, the General Assembly has provided limited lottery funds for school construction which have only recently been expanded from \$100 million flat in previous years to \$130 million this year and \$175 million next year. This is still below the 40% that was promised to counties with passage of the lottery.

**<u>Requested Action</u>**: Pass H866/S542 bonds for school capital and H333 local sales tax flexibility for education.

**Background and Goal Status**: The statutory provisions for school funding divide the responsibility between state and county governments. Over time, the partnership and responsibilities have become blurred, with the state providing some capital funds and counties supplementing operating expenses.

From 1949 until 1996, the state passed bonds to fund school capital. The state also established the Public School Capital Fund and the Critical School Facility Needs Fund in 1987. They were funded through corporate income taxes, state sales tax and withholding tax. The funds were eventually eliminated.

When the North Carolina Education lottery passed, counties received 40% of the lottery proceeds, which were dedicated to education for their school construction needs.

The lottery was lauded as a solution to school capital funding because it was a consistent, stable, constantly growing revenue source.

However, in 2011, the General Assembly eliminated the 40% standard and replaced it with an annual appropriation that was a flat \$100 million until 2017 when it was increased to \$130 million in total and will grow to \$175 million next year. This represents around 20% of lottery proceeds in 2017. The final budget allocated \$100 million from lottery proceeds to the Public School Building Capital Fund and adds \$30 million in FY 2018 and \$75 million in FY 2019 to a newly-created Needs-Based Public School Capital Fund. Legislation authorizing expansion of local option sales taxes and a statewide bond referendum did not pass but is eligible for short session.

NCACC remains committed to this three pronged approach (increased lottery funding; a bond; local option sales tax) to meet county school capital needs.

**2018 Goal:** Seek legislation to repeal the statutory authority under NC G.S. 115C-431(c) that allows local school boards to file suit against a county board of commissioners over county appropriations for education.

#### Talking Points:

- N.C. Gen. Stat. 115C-431(c) expressly authorizes school boards to sue counties over "sufficiency" of current expense or capital funding levels, leaving courts and juries to determine sufficiency.
- This statutory authorization inherently creates an adversarial relationship between the school boards and the boards of county commissioners and has cost taxpayers millions of dollars in legal fees and litigation expenses.
- In 2016, the General Assembly passed legislation directing legislative staff in the Program Evaluation Division to conduct a study of the current process. That study is complete.

**Requested Action:** Repeal the statutory provision that expressly authorizes school boards to sue county commissioners over local education appropriations and implement an alternate process such as the one recommended by the PED report.

<u>Background and Goal Status</u>: A local school board is required to submit its budget request to the board of county commissioners. If a dispute arises over the amount appropriated, N.C.G.S. 115C-431 governs the process for resolving that dispute and permits school boards to sue boards of commissioners. School boards are not expressly permitted to sue the state or federal government for lack of adequate funding, and no other entity is specifically granted this power to sue a taxing authority over funding sufficiency.

An alternate means of resolving these disputes is necessary to foster more collaborative relationships between the two boards and to safeguard against the needless expenditure of taxpayer dollars to fund litigation and legal expenses.

S531/H305 School Boards Can't Sue Counties amended the statute that establishes the dispute resolution process for boards of county commissioners and boards of education. S531 passed the Senate with bipartisan support but was not heard in the House and is eligible for short session.

The NCGA's Program Evaluation Division completed a study and report on the issue. The study recommends limiting school boards ability to sue and establishes a funding mechanism in the event that the dispute resolution process is not successful. NCACC supports legislation that would implement a process similar to that in the PED report.

**2018 Goal:** Support efforts to preserve and expand the existing local revenue base of counties, and oppose efforts to divert to the state fees or taxes currently allocated to the counties to the state. Oppose efforts to erode existing county revenue streams and authorize local option revenue sources already given to any other jurisdiction.

#### Talking Points:

- Counties have the authority to enact sales taxes through five statutory Articles. Some of these sales taxes are earmarked for specific purposes such as the Article 43 ¼ cent for public transit (½ cent for six counties)
- Counties are not requesting an increase in the overall statutory cap, just the flexibility to use funds to address local needs within the existing five Articles
- Counties need a stable and consistent revenue source to provide effective, efficient services.

**<u>Requested Action</u>**: Pass H333 or similar legislation to expand flexibility for counties to use Article 43 and Article 46 sales taxes for educational and general purposes.

<u>Background and Goal Status</u>: Through five laws addressing county sales tax authority, 94 counties have the authority to raise up to 2.5 cents of sales tax while six have the authority to raise up to 2.75 cents. Some of the revenues from these Articles are earmarked for specific uses such as public transit funding. Four counties have approved the Article 43 transit tax, while 31 counties have approved the Article 46 tax for general purposes.

County boards are the closest level of government to the people of North Carolina, and counties are in the best position to understand and respond to local needs. As such, counties should have more flexibility to use local revenues to address local challenges whether they are infrastructure, education, economic development or other needs.

Three bills (H437, S166 and H333) were all aimed at expanding local revenue flexibility, including using revenue now earmarked for public transit for education, without raising the overall cap on sales taxes. H333 passed the House, but the Senate was unwilling to consider any of the bills. All are eligible for short session.

<u>2018 Goal:</u> Seek legislation, funding, and other efforts to expand digital infrastructure/broadband capability to the un-served and under-served areas of the state.

### Talking Points:

- As technology plays a larger role in the classroom, county-supported broadband infrastructure in partnership with the private sector can help connect students in the classroom and at home. This ensures critical learning and networking opportunities are not missed for students without internet connectivity to the home.
- High speed Internet access is essential to economic development, and allowing counties to deploy broadband infrastructure and services will help attract, retain and grow commerce.

**Requested Action:** Pass H390/S208 to support broadband access for residents, and businesses through policies and funding that allow counties to invest in digital infrastructure.

<u>Background:</u> Across the state, county leaders are hearing about the "homework gap." While students have access to the internet at school, many do not have internet in the home and therefore are disadvantaged when studying, completing homework, and applying to college. This gap will grow as the state's funding for classroom books shifts to digital textbooks. High speed internet access is also crucial for job searches, online business development, and access to health care in rural areas.

Counties currently have limited authority to provide grants to encourage broadband access for economic development, but counties need additional tools to help enhance internet connectivity using public-private partnerships. House Bill 390 and Senate Bill 208 (Counties/Internet Infrastructure) would give counties the authority to build out internet infrastructure to expand access in partnership with private internet service providers.

The North Carolina Broadband Plan commissioned by the General Assembly in 2015 recommends ways to lower cost barriers by clarifying county ability to invest in grants and infrastructure, and lease digital infrastructure to the private sector. Amending the law in two places could leverage county assets to partner with private internet service providers and help lower barriers to access and adoption. The first change would allow counties to own certain digital assets and lease them to the private sector. The second change would expand the types of funding sources counties can use to provide grants to increase access for economic development under existing law.

**2018 Goal:** Support legislation providing flexibility to align K-12 and community college calendar.

### **Talking Points:**

- Currently, community college classes start in early August while public schools begin in late August.
- Both systems and the families involved would benefit if the systems were allowed to coordinate their school year calendars to best meet their needs.
- Flexibility would allow for more effective use of continuing technical education resources, allow public school students to take community college courses during their normal school day, and improve efficiencies combining community college students, early college students, and high school students for instruction.

**<u>Requested Action</u>**: Pass H375 to allow LEA's the flexibility to align local K-12 school calendars with community college calendars.

### **Background and Goals Status:**

School calendar flexibility has been an NCACC legislative goal for some time. The issue is gaining urgency as more communities develop stronger partnerships between K-12 schools and community colleges in the form of Early College and other career readiness programs. Providing more flexibility to LEA's to determine school calendars would increase student participation and buy-in in these programs.

One statewide bill, H375, granting local boards of education the ability to align school start dates with that of a community college serving the county, passed the House but saw no action in the Senate. Legislation establishing a pilot program authorizing school calendar flexibility for 20 school districts, H389, also was passed by the House and included in the House budget. The Senate took no action on H389 and the final budget did not include the language. Both H375 and H389 remain eligible for consideration in 2018. Additionally, dozens of local bills granting local calendar flexibility were introduced during the 2017 session, but none saw action by the General Assembly.

## HALIFAX COUNTY JUVENILE CRIME PREVENTION COUNCIL EXECUTIVE SUMMARY 2018 - 2019

The Halifax County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, as completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY 2019 through FY 2020.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Halifax County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

JCPC Action Plan: An Action Plan to impact delinquent behavior (included in this document) has been developed. With the goals, measurable objectives and corresponding outcomes, the JCPC proposes to:

Prevent and reduce delinquent behaviors
Increase public awareness and delinquency prevention
Provide a continuum of community resources to address delinquency and at-risk behaviors

Choose the most appropriate programs to serve the needs of the youth with the money allocated to Halifax County.

<u>Priorities for Funding:</u> Through a risk and needs assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Halifax County.

- > Mentoring Services
- Parent and Family Skill Building
- > Interpersonal Skill Building
- ➤ Emergency Therapeutic Foster Care
- > Restitution/Community Service Program
- > Juvenile Structured Day
- > Home Based Family Counseling
- > Tutoring and Academic Enhancement

- > Vocational Skills
- ➤ Substance Abuse Treatment/Education
- > Teen Court

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions. The JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its action plan and its funded programs on a quarterly basis. Monitoring Forms are attached for the following programs:

- ➤ Operation Restart
- > Operation Restart Community Service
- ➤ Methodist Home for Children Therapeutic Foster Care

<u>Funding Recommendations</u>: Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (NC DJJDP). Funds to the following programs is the amounts specified below for FY 2018-2019 in the amount of \$207,002.

- 1. Operation Restart/Community Services ...... \$160,002.
- 2. Methodist Home for Children Therapeutic Foster Care ..... \$27,000.
- 3. Resolve It Together ...... \$18,000.

The JCPC further recommends that the following amount be allocated from the NC DPS/DJJ funds for the administrative costs of the Council for FY 2018-2019 \$2,000.

#### **Halifax County Cooperative Extension Agency**

Operation Restart Program is designed to provide interpersonal skill building. Through the Cooperative Learning Model, Operation Restart will help teach positive human relationships, multiple intelligent systems, positive independence, and individual accountability. Through the model, the program will provide structured activities that teach positive working relationships, how to set and reach clear learning and behavioral goals, and strategies to help youth complete tasks.

Operation Restart Restitution Program is designed to provide opportunities for juveniles to be held accountable for their actions to the community and their victims through performing supervised community service work and or monetary payment within the timeline stipulated in the court orders or diversion contracts.

#### **Methodist Home for Children**

Provide therapeutic foster care for youth (male and female) age 10-17 involved with the Division of Juvenile Justice in Halifax County. Therapeutic Foster Care caters to the physical, emotional, and social needs of youth in a supportive family setting.

#### **Mediation Center of Eastern North Carolina**

The Resolve It Together, evidence-based program, focuses on helping at-risk and adjudicated youth and their families develop skills and strategies for positively resolving conflict, both within the family and in the community, through facilitated activities and 25,000 conversations in a multi-family group setting.

- The lowest cost proposal was submitted by Envirolink, Inc. for a cost of \$62,177.15 per year. The primary reason the new contract price would be significantly less than the current contract is the hydrants have all been painted under the original contract and only require touch up painting now.
- It is my opinion that the Envirolink, Inc. proposal is significantly lower than the other vendors because Envirolink is familiar with what is involved in completing the scope of work and already has resources in place.



A requirement of Halifax County's 2013 CDBG-Infrastructure grant was to conduct an Assessment of Fair Housing in Halifax County. This assessment has been completed using the guidelines provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and the NC Division of Environmental Quality (DEQ).

Included in this assessment is a current demographic profile for Halifax County, as well as a presentation of housing costs and conditions. A particular emphasis was placed on housing costs as they relate to lower household income families.

Below are some of the factors affecting households in Halifax County as it relates to the local economy, availability of fair housing, as well as they're overall economic well-being.

- 1. Slow population growth decrease of 3.4% from 2010 (54,691 population in 2010; 52,849 in 2016)
- 2. Persons below poverty level 26.8% (2012-2016)
- 3. Unemployment Rate 11.6% (Avg. 2012-2016)
- 4. Median Household Income \$32,548 (2012-2016)
- 5. Per capita Income \$20,134 (2012-2016)
- 6. Aging Housing Stock 11,702 units (54.8% of total constructed prior to 1960)
- 7. 28.5% of owner-occupied housing units with a mortgage monthly housing costs exceeds 30% of monthly income
- 8. 49% of tenant-occupied housing units monthly housing cost exceeds 30% of monthly income

Also included in the preparation of the fair housing assessment was an effort to solicit information from local residents and businesses regarding their knowledge of fair housing laws, as well as their perception of the availability of fair housing in Halifax County. Surveys were mailed to over 60 real estate firms, private and public housing providers and banks with eight responses. Further, the County Manager's office posted a survey on the County's website. There were 21 participants in this survey. Finally, the County sponsored a booth at the 2018 Senior Expo held on April 26, 2018 at the Kirkwood Adams Civic Center. Over 200 Fair Housing booklets and informational pieces were distributed at this event and a fair housing survey was also made available for participants. Thirty-two surveys were completed by attendees.

While responses to the surveys did not indicate any actual fair housing discriminatory activity, it is clear that the County's continued emphasis on educating the public and housing service providers about Fair Housing and its positive impact on county residents should remain a priority.

Upon the Board of Commissioner's review and discussion, your approval and acceptance of the 2018 Assessment of Fair Housing is requested. The final document will be provided to DEQ for their acceptance. I will be in attendance at your May 7, 2018 meeting to answer any questions.



#### **SUPPORTING INFORMATION:**

Our Community Hospital ("OCH") closed permanently on December 31, 2017. The hospital had been financially supported by a district property tax in Palmyra, Roseneath, Scotland Neck and Conoconara Townships since the early 1960's. No district tax levy will be included in the FY 18-19 budget ordinance. However, motor vehicle property taxes (under the "tax and tag" system) continue to be collected until the end of this fiscal year, and delinquent property taxes in the hospital district will continue to be collected until the lien for those taxes fully expire over the next 10 years. In addition, sales and use taxes will continue to accrue to the hospital district for about one more year under the ad valorem sales tax distribution method. These revenues can only be used to support hospital operations. Therefore, staff has developed a proposed agreement between the County and OCH regarding the use of post-closure district tax receipts to help cover preclosure hospital expenses and obligations. A copy of the proposed agreement is attached. As you will discern, the purpose of the agreement is to prevent the use of hospital district tax revenues for purposes other than the payment of hospital operations.

#### AGREEMENT REGARDING REVENUES COLLECTED IN THE OUR COMMUNITY HOSPITAL TAX DISTRICT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into effective as of the day of
, 2018, by and between HALIFAX COUNTY, a unit of local
government (hereinafter "the County"), and OUR COMMUNITY HOSPITAL,
INCORPORATED, a North Carolina nonprofit corporation (hereinafter "OCH");

#### WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, OCH owned and operated a community hospital in the Town of Scotland Neck until December 31, 2017, when the hospital was permanently closed; and

WHEREAS, since the early 1960's the County has levied a voter-approved hospital district property tax in Palmyra, Roseneath, Scotland Neck and Conoconara Townships specifically designated and earmarked for the support of the hospital under Session Laws 1959-361, 1963-225, 1963-432, 1967-110 and 1971-249; and

WHEREAS, the property tax revenues generated in the hospital district tax may only be appropriated and expended for the support of the hospital services provided by OCH; and

WHEREAS, although the hospital tax district has not yet been dissolved, OCH has requested that the County not levy a property tax in the hospital district for FY 2018-19 and going forward; and

WHEREAS, although no hospital district tax will be levied beginning in FY 2018-19, delinquent hospital district taxes from prior years and hospital district taxes on motor vehicles registered between January 1, 2018 and June 30, 2018, will continued to be collected; and

WHEREAS, so long as local sales and use tax distribution in Halifax County continues to be calculated under the ad valorem method of distribution (see G.S. 105-472), some portion of local sales and use taxes will be allocated to the hospital tax district based on the property tax rate in the district; and

WHEREAS, although the hospital is now closed, OCH has financial obligations remaining from the operation of the hospital through December 31, 2017; and

WHEREAS, the County and OCH desire to make arrangements for the lawful appropriation and expenditure of the property tax revenues resulting from the levy of a property tax in the hospital tax district and the apportioned local sales and use tax revenues resulting from the use of the ad valorem method of local sales and use tax distribution;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises recited above and benefits to be derived from the terms and conditions set forth below, all of which are deemed legally sufficient by the undersigned, the County and OCH agree as follows:

1. Use of Hospital District Taxes for Pre-Closure Hospital Expenses and

**Obligations**. To the extent needed to cover all expenses, obligations, or deficits associated with the operation of the hospital (including the ER), all hospital tax district revenues collected by the County will be paid over to OCH for the sole purpose of meeting those remaining obligations. Hospital district tax revenues will not be used to cover any prior, current or future expenses associated with any other non-hospital facilities operated by Our Community Hospital, Inc., or its successor in interest (such as the long-term care and therapy centers). The County acknowledges that OCH has provided a statement of all expenses, obligations, or deficits associated with the operation of the hospital through and including December 31, 2017. This

statement included obligations incurred but not yet payable for things such as vacation time

accrued by hospital staff prior to closing, etc. This statement may be subject to amendment from time to time as other pre-closing obligations are discovered. The purpose of this statement of expenses is to insure that the remaining tax revenues are only used to support hospital operations through December 31, 2017.

- 2. **Hospital Accounts Receivable**. Within 15 days from the execution of this Agreement and subject to HIPAA and other regulations related to the confidentiality of protected health information, OCH will provide the County with the details of all accounts receivable related to hospital operations, regardless of whether those accounts receivable arose before or after December 31, 2017. OCH will also certify total receipts from those accounts receivable as of the date of certification. Those receipts will be credited to the hospital expenses and obligations referenced in Item 1 above. Thereafter, on a monthly basis, OCH will update its certification of accounts receivable and receipts from accounts receivable so that they may be credited to the remaining pre-closure hospital expenses and obligations.
- 3. **Disbursement of Hospital District Taxes as Collected**. So long as expenses and obligations related to hospital operations through December 31, 2017, remain, the County will continue to pay over delinquent property tax revenues and motor vehicle tax revenues arising from the hospital tax district to OCH as they are collected.
- 4. Payment in Full of Pre-Closure Expenses and Obligations. After it is determined to the satisfaction of OCH and the County that all hospital operation expenses and obligations have been paid in full, the County will cease disbursement of hospital tax district revenues to OCH, and any hospital tax district revenues held by OCH will be remitted to the County. All hospital tax revenues thereafter collected by the County shall be retained by the County. These

"excess" hospital tax district revenues shall be appropriated and expended in the manner contemplated below. (See Section 5).

- 5. Use of "Excess" Hospital District Taxes. Halifax County intends to seek local legislation from the General Assembly (and, if necessary, voter approval) to (1) terminate the hospital taxing district and (2) authorize the appropriation and expenditure of excess hospital district tax revenues for a purpose or purposes that will improve access to healthcare for the citizens of Halifax County that live in the former hospital tax district. The County will solicit input from OCH as well as other governmental agencies, organizations and citizens regarding how the excess hospital tax district revenues might be best used.
- 6. **Local Sales and Use Taxes**. Assuming the ad valorem method of local sales and use taxes remains in effect, any local sales and use taxes apportioned to the hospital tax district property tax levy will be appropriated and expended under the same terms and conditions set forth above.
- 7. **Taxpayer Claims for Refund**. If, pursuant to G.S. 105-381, it is determined by court decree that any property tax levied and collected in the hospital tax district is subject to refund, OCH will reimburse the full amount subject to refund to the County for refund to the complaining tax payer(s). Therefore, this Agreement shall remain in effect for a period of six months after all hospital expenses referenced in Section 1 have been paid, unless there are pending claims for refund under G.S. 105-381, in which event this Agreement shall not terminate until those claims are resolved. OCH will not dissolve so long as this Agreement remains in effect.
- 8. **Amendment**. This Agreement may be amended by mutual written consent of the parties.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have caused this Agreement to be executed by their duly authorized officers, effective as of the date and year first above written.
